# Senate gives final approval to debt ceiling deal

# **APC** members give their approval to two petitions

The Wells County Area Plan Commission approved a request to seek a zoning change for property in Ossian and also approved a three-lot major subdivision for property at Ind. 1 and Wells County Road 850N near Ossian.

The rezoning request is for land at 1326 E. Lafever St. in Ossian and the request was made by Barkley Properties LLC. The property - a vacant lot - is currently zoned B-1 (business) and the request was to rezone it as R-3 (residential).

The petition stated that the rezoning would "allow the construction of new apartments similar to ones already built in town and currently being built in Wells

Mike Lautzenheiser, executive director of the APC, said the prop-

erty is in a residential area and that the county's new comprehensive plan, Vision 2035, indicated that the property should be zoned for housing.

The APC members — Harry Baumgartner Jr., Tyson Brooks, Chandler Gerber, Jarrod Hahn, Keira Lance, Jerome Markley, Tim Rohr, Becky Stone-Smith, Melissa Woodworth, and Issac Zent — all voted in favor of the rezoning request. Zent substituted for regular member John Schuhmacher.

The APC's vote, however, is only a recommendation to the Ossian Town Council. The council has the final say on whether the property is rezoned.

The major subdivision request is for 33.44 acres on 850N. The request was filed by OD Inc., owner of the property.

In the end, the debt ceiling showdown was a familiar high-stakes battle in Congress, a fight taken on by McCarthy and powered by a hard-right House Republican majority confronting the Democratic president with a new era of divided government in Washington.

Refusing a once routine vote to allow a the nation's debt limit to be lifted without concessions, McCarthy brought Biden's White House to the negotiating table to strike an agreement that forces spending cutbacks aimed at curbing the nation's deficits.

Overall, the 99-page bill restricts spending for the next two years, suspends the debt ceiling into January 2025 and changes some policies, including imposing new work requirements for older Americans receiving food aid and greenlighting an Appalachian natural gas line that many Democrats

It bolsters funds for defense and veterans, cuts back new money for Internal Revenue Service agents and rejects Biden's call to roll back Trump-era tax breaks on corporations and the wealthy to help cover the nation's deficits. It imposes automatic 1% cuts if Congress fails approve its annual spending bills.

After the House overwhelmingly approved the package late Wednesday, Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell signaled he too wanted to waste no

time ensuring it became law. Touting its budget cuts, McConnell said Thursday, "The Senate has a chance to make that important progress a reality.

Having remained largely on the sidelines during much of the Biden-McCarthy negotiations, several senators insisted on debate over their ideas to reshape the package. But making any changes at this stage would almost certainly derail the compromise and none were approved.

Instead, senators dragged through rounds of voting late into the night rejecting the various amendments, but making their preferences clear. Conservative Republican senators wanted to include further cut spending, while Democratic Sen. Tim Kaine of Virginia sought to remove the Mountain Valley Pipeline approval.

The energy pipeline is important to Sen. Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., and he defended the development running through his state, saying the country cannot run without the power of gas, coal, wind and all available energy sources.

But, offering an amendment to strip the pipeline from the package, Kaine argued it would not be fair for Congress to step into a controversial project that he said would also course through his state and scoop up lands in Appalachia that have been in families for generations.

Defense hawks led by Sen. Lindsey Graham of South Carolina complained strongly that military spending, though boosted in the deal, was not enough to keep pace with inflation particularly as they eye supplemental spending that will be needed this summer to support Ukraine against the war waged by Russian President Vladimir Putin.

"Putin's invasion is a defining moment of the 21st century," Graham argued from the Senate floor. "What the House did is wrong.

They secured an agreement from Schumer, which he read on the floor, stating that the debt ceiling deal "does nothing" to limit the Senate's ability to approve other emergency supplemental funds for national security, including for Ukraine, or for disaster relief and other issues of national importance.

For weeks negotiators labored late into the night to strike the deal with the White House, and for days McCarthy had worked to build support among skep-

Tensions had run high in the House the night before as hard-right Republicans refused the deal. Ominously, the conservatives warned of possibly trying to oust McCarthy over the issue.

But Biden and McCarthy assembled a bipartisan coalition, with Democrats ensuring passage on a robust 314-117 vote. All told, 71

House Republicans broke with McCarthy to reject the

"We did pretty dang good," McCarthy, R-Calif., said afterward.

As for discontent from Republicans who said the spending restrictions did not go far enough, McCarthy said it was only a "first step.

The White House immediately turned its attention to the Senate, its top staff phoning individual senators.

Democrats also had complaints, decrying the new work requirements for older Americans, those 50-54, in the food aid program, the changes to the landmark National Environmental Policy Act and approval of the controversial Mountain Valley Pipeline natural gas project they argue is unhelpful in fighting climate change.

The nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office said the spending restrictions in the package would reduce deficits by \$1.5 trillion over the decade, a top goal for the Republicans trying to curb the debt load.

In a surprise that complicated Republicans' support, however, the CBO said their drive to impose work requirements on older Americans receiving food stamps would end up boosting spending by \$2.1 billion over the time period. That's because the final deal exempts veterans and homeless people, expanding the food stamp rolls by 78,000 people monthly, the CBO said.

# **Shah wins National** Spelling Bee, ending spelling career on top

OXON HILL, Md. (AP) — Soft-spoken but brimming with confidence, Dev Shah asked precise questions about obscure Greek roots, rushed through his second-to-last word and rolled to the Scripps National Spelling Bee title Thurs-

Dev, a 14-year-old from Largo, Florida, had his spelling career interrupted by the pandemic, then didn't make it out of his regional bee last year. He got through his highly competitive regional this year for a third and final try at the national title, and he ended up holding the trophy over his head as confetti fell.

His winning word was "psammophile," a layup for a speller of his caliber.

"Psammo meaning sand, Greek?" he asked. "Phile, meaning love, Greek?

Dev soaked up the moment by asking for the word to be used in a sentence, something he described a day earlier as a stalling tactic. Then he put his hands over his face as he was declared the winner.

Charlotte Walsh, a 14-year-old from Arlington, Virginia, was the runner-up, and she gave Dev a congratulatory hug. Dev, who previously appeared in the bee in 2019 and 2021, was close with many of his fellow finalists.

"They've all been in many online bees and many Scripps National Spelling Bees, and I felt like a spark and a camaraderie between all of us," he said. "I'm very grateful and I'm privileged that I could be in a spelling bee with them one final time.'

Fifteen months ago, it was hardly a sure thing Dev would be back. He had a miserable experience at his regional bee last year, finishing fourth after spelling for five hours in damp, chilly weather at an outdoor soccer stadium in Orlando.

"It took me I would say at least four months to get back on track," he said. "I just didn't know if I wanted to keep

continuing. When the field had been narrowed to just Dev and Charlotte, Scripps brought out the buzzer used for its "spell-off" tiebreaker, and Dev was momentarily confused when he

stepped to the microphone. "This is not the spell-off, right?" Dev asked. Told it was not, he spelled "bathypitotmeter" so quickly that it might as well have been, the latest example of his unassuming

"I practiced for the spell-off every day, I guess. I knew it might happen and I prepared for everything, so I kind of went into spell-off mode," Dev said. "But I also was scared

Dev wins more than \$50,000 in cash and prizes and is the 22nd champion in the past 24 years with South Asian heritage. His father, Deval, a software engineer, immigrated to the United States from India 29 years ago to get his master's degree in electrical engineering. He has since added an MBA from the University of Florida. Dev's older brother,

Neil, is a rising junior at Yale. Deval said his son showed an incredible recall with words starting at age 3, and Dev spent many years in participating in academic competitions staged by the North South Foundation, a nonprofit that provides scholarships to children in India.

The bee began in 1925 and is open to students through the eighth grade. Spellers qualify by winning regional competitions around the country. There were 229 kids onstage at the beginning of this year's national bee — and each was a champion many times over, considering that 11 million participated at the school level.

While the bee is smaller and the field not as deep as in pre-pandemic years, this year's finalists demonstrated an impressive depth of knowledge as they worked their way through a sometimes diabolical word list.

#### Amazon to pay \$3M in privacy violation fines FTC Commissioner Alvaro Bedoya enabled hackers to take control of

WASHINGTON (AP) - Amazon agreed Wednesday to pay a \$25 million civil penalty to settle Federal Trade Commission allegations it violated a child privacy law and deceived parents by keeping for years kids' voice and location data recorded by its popular Alexa voice assistant.

Separately, the company agreed to pay \$5.8 million in customer refunds for alleged privacy violations involving its doorbell camera Ring.

The Alexa-related action orders Amazon to overhaul its data deletion practices and impose stricter, more transparent privacy measures. It also obliges the tech giant to delete certain data collected by its internet-connected digital assistant, which people use for everything from checking the weather to playing games and queueing up music.

"Amazon's history of misleading parents, keeping children's recordings indefinitely, and flouting parents' deletion requests violated COPPA (the Child Online Privacy Protection Act) and sacrificed privacy for profits,' Samuel Levine, the FCT consumer protection chief, said in a statement. The 1998 law is designed to shield children from online harms.

said in a statement that "when parents asked Amazon to delete their kids' Alexa voice data, the company did not

The agency ordered the company to delete inactive child accounts as well as certain voice and geolocation

Amazon kept the kids' data to refine its voice recognition algorithm, the artificial intelligence behind Alexa, which powers Echo and other smart speakers, Bedoya said. The FTC complaint sends a message to all tech companies who are "sprinting to do the same" amid fierce competition in

developing AI datasets, he added. "Nothing is more visceral to a parent than the sound of their child's voice," tweeted Bedoya, the father of

two small children. Amazon said last month that it has sold more than a half-billion Alexaenabled devices globally and that use of the service increased 35 percent last

In the Ring case, the FTC says Amazon's home security camera subsidiary let employees and contractors access consumers' private videos and providing lax security practices that some accounts.

Amazon bought California-based Ring in 2018, and many of the violations alleged by the FTC predate the acquisition. Under the FTC's order, Ring is required to pay \$5.8 million that would be used for consumer

Amazon said it disagreed with the FTC's claims on both Alexa and Ring and denied violating the law. But it said the settlements "put these matters behind us." "Our devices and services are built

to protect customers' privacy, and to provide customers with control over their experience," the Seattle-based company said.

In addition to the fine in the Alexa case, the proposed order prohibits Amazon from using deleted geolocation and voice information to create or improve any data product. The order also requires Amazon to create a privacy program for its use of geolocation information.

The proposed orders must be approved by federal judges.

FTC commissioners had unanimously voted to file the charges against Amazon in both cases.

# Woman finds ancient mastodon tooth on beach

APTOS, Calif. (AP) - A woman taking a Memorial Day weekend stroll on a California beach found something unusual sticking out of the sand: a tooth from an ancient mastodon.

But then the fossil vanished, and it took a media blitz and a kind-hearted jogger to find it again.

Jennifer Schuh found the foot-long (.30-meter) tooth sticking out of the sand on Friday at the mouth of Aptos Creek on Rio Del Mar State Beach, located off Monterey Bay in Santa Cruz County on California's central

"I was on one side of the creek and this lady was talking to me on the other side and she said what's that at your feet," Schuh recounted. "It looked kind of weird, like burnt almost.'

Schuh wasn't sure what she had found. So she snapped some photos and posted them on Facebook, asking for help.

Thompson, paleontology collections advisor for the Santa Cruz Museum of Natural History.

The answer came from Wayne

Thompson determined that the

object was a worn molar from an adult Pacific mastodon, an extinct elephantlike species.

"This is an extremely important find," Thompson wrote, and he urged Schuh to call him.

But when they went back to the beach, the tooth was gone. A weekend search failed to find it. Thompson then sent out a social media

request for help in finding the artifact. The plea made international headlines. On Tuesday, Jim Smith of nearby Aptos called the museum.

"I was so excited to get that call," said Liz Broughton, the museum's visitor experience manager. "Jim told us that he had stumbled upon it during one of his regular jogs along the beach, but wasn't sure of what he had found until he saw a picture of the tooth on the news.'

Smith donated the tooth to the museum, where it will be on display Friday through Sunday.

The age of the tooth isn't clear. A museum blog says mastodons generally roamed California from about 5 million to 10,000 years ago.

"We can safely say this specimen would be less than 1 million years old, which is relatively 'new' by fossil standards," Broughton said in an

Broughton said it is common for winter storms to uncover fossils in the region and it may have washed down to the ocean from higher up.

Schuh said she is thrilled that her find could help unlock ancient secrets about the peaceful beach area. She didn't keep the tooth, but she did hop on Amazon and order herself a replica mastodon tooth necklace.

"You don't often get to touch something from history," she said.

It's only the third find of a locally recorded mastodon fossil. The museum also has another tooth along with a skull that was found by a teenager in 1980. It was found in the same Aptos Creek that empties into the ocean.

"We are thrilled about this exciting discovery and the implications it holds for our understanding of ancient life in our region," museum Executive Director Felicia B. Van Stolk said in a state-

#### Indiana state legislator arrested on suspicion of drunken driving

SEYMOUR, Ind. (AP) — A state lawmaker from southern Indiana was arrested early Wednesday on suspicion of drunken driving after crashing his vehicle at an Interstate 65 interchange and leaving the scene, state

Republican Rep. Jim Lucas of Seymour was booked into the Jackson County Jail on preliminary charges that include driving while intoxicated and leaving the scene of a crash with property damage.

Lucas, who was first elected to the Legislature in 2012, is a prominent supporter of loosening state gun laws and marijuana legalization. He has faced controversy several times for what critics called racist social media posts, including in 2020 when he posted a meme that showed black children in diapers dancing with the caption, "We gon' get free money!

His legislative office didn't immediately respond to a request for comment about his arrest. A spokeswoman for Republican House Speaker Todd Huston said he would not be commenting on "Lucas' personal matter.'

Police were called soon after midnight Wednesday about a vehicle crashing into a guardrail at the I-65 and Indiana 11 interchange just north of Seymour, state police pokesman Sgt. Stephen Wheeles said. That vehicle was found on the north side of Seymour with heavy damage and officers stopped Lucas as he was walking nearby, Wheeles said.

Lucas was arrested after troopers conducted sobriety tests and results on blood tests for his intoxication level were not yet available, he said.

#### Indianapolis man gets 30 years for fatal 2020 shooting of mail carrier

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — An Indianapolis man who pleaded guilty to fatally shooting a U.S. Postal Service mail carrier has been sentenced to 30 years in federal prison, prosecutors said.

Tony Cushingberry, 24, was sentenced Wednesday after pleading guilty in July 2022 to second-degree murder and discharging a firearm during a crime of violence, the U.S. Attorney's Office said.

Prosecutors said Cushingberry was sitting on his porch on April 27, 2020, when he watched postal carrier Angela Summers, 45, of Indianapolis, walk past his home and proceed to the next residence.

According to court records, Cushingberry was upset because his postal deliveries had been suspended due to an aggressive dog at his home.

After Summers walked past his home, prosecutors said Cushingberry "aggressively approached" her on his neighbor's porch and demanded his mail several times. He continued pursuing Summers while displaying a handgun before he pulled the gun from his waistband and shot her in the chest from several feet away.



# Man has charges dropped in deaths of 2 hunters

DETROIT (AP) — Prosecutors dropped murder charges Thursday against a man who spent nearly 21 years in prison for the fatal shooting of two Michigan hunters.

Jeff Titus was released in February when authorities acknowledged that critical information in police files about another suspect — an Ohio serial killer — was never shared with his trial lawyer in 2002.

His convictions were thrown out as a result. Now, after reviewing the case for three months, Kalamazoo County prosecutor Jeff Getting said Titus will not face a new trial.

"This is the right thing to do," Getting told reporters. At the same news con-

ference, Titus, 71, said he's "truly innocent."

'You can put me on the rack, the truth serum, whatever. I did not do it. ... I did not shoot those people," Titus said.

Earlier, expressing relief, he said: "Forgive me if I start crying."

Doug Estes and Jim Bennett were fatally shot near Titus' rural property in 1990. Titus was cleared as a suspect — he had been hunting deer 27 miles away - but murder charges were filed against him 12 years later, after a new team of investigators had reopened the case.

There was no physical evidence against Titus, who was portrayed as a hothead who didn't like trespassers.

The Innocence Clinic at University of Michigan law school was working to get Titus' convictions overturned when a dusty 30-page file from the original investigation was discovered at the sheriff's office. It was a blockbuster: It referred to an alternate suspect, Thomas Dillon of Magnolia, Ohio.

That information was never shared with Titus' trial lawyer, a fundamental violation.

Jacinda Davis, at the TV network Investigation Discovery, and Susan Simpson, through the podcast "Undisclosed," had raised doubts about Titus' guilt and aired questions about Dillon's possible role.







# This is the 'America First' case for supporting Ukraine

As Ukraine begins its spring counteroffensive, a 60 percent majority of Republicans say we should stand with Ukraine until Russia is defeated, according to a Harvard CAPS-Harris Poll conducted in March. But GOP support is softening. The share of Republicans who say the United States is providing too much aid to Ukraine has steadily increased from 9 percent right after the Russian invasion to 40 percent today, according to a Pew Research Center poll in January.

Many wavering Republicans are frustrated by the lack of a clear strategy for victory from the Biden administration. They hear Ukraine skeptics on the right arguing that the war is costing too much, depleting our military readiness, increasing the risk of nuclear confrontation with Russia and distracting us from the larger threat posed by Communist China. Some are beginning to ask whether U.S. support for Ukraine is really in the nation's interest.

It's a fair question. Most conservatives are not isolationists; they are reluctant internationalists, willing to support U.S. leadership on the world stage — as long as they are convinced our national interest is involved. Altruistic arguments of solidarity with the Ukrainian people are not enough; they demand an "America First" case for supporting Ukraine.

Here it is, in 10 clear points. 1. A Russian victory would reinforce a narrative of American weakness and embolden our enemies.

Ask yourself: Did President Biden's humiliating withdrawal from Afghanistan embolden Russian President Vladimir Putin to invade Ukraine? Of course it did. And Putin watched Biden's subsequent

capitulation on the Nord Stream 2 natural gas pipeline, and his reluctance to send Ukraine lethal military aid as Russia massed troops on Ukraine's border. The Russian leader concluded that Biden was weak.

Now, imagine if Biden had followed the advice of those on the right who oppose aid and had refused to arm Ukraine. Putin would have taken Kyiv. And many of the same conservatives who are now criticizing the president for doing too much would have said: Biden is catastrophically weak. First, he let the Taliban march into Kabul, and now he has let the Russians to march

into Kyiv. And they would have been right.

2. A Ukrainian victory will help deter China.

If the Afghanistan debacle emboldened Putin, how much more would U.S. weakness in Ukraine embolden Chinese dictator Xi Jinping? The risk of war over Taiwan would skyrocket. And, unlike the war in Ukraine, it could very well involve U.S.

Think of Xi's calculation: If the United

States won't stand fast for Ukraine, an internationally recognized sovereign state, how likely is a stalwart defense of Taiwan, which is not? And if the United States is not willing to spend money to defend Ukraine, is it really going to risk American lives to defend Taiwan? 3. Defeating Putin would weaken

the Sino-Russian partnership. Xi seeks a Chinese-led global order that favors the world's autocracies. In pursuit of that goal, he made a bet on Putin, and has

met with him some 40 times since assuming power in 2012. China's "nolimits" partnership with Russia "is a signature personal policy of Xi Jinping," former Trump deputy national security adviser Matthew Pottinger tells me. "Putin's defeat would do a lot of damage to Xi's credibility" by making it clear the Chinese leader backed a loser.

4. Support for Ukraine will

restore the Reagan Doctrine. For most of the past two decades, U.S. foreign policy has followed the Bush Doctrine. After the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, we would not wait to be struck again. We would fight terrorists abroad so we did not have to face them here at home. The doctrine helped prevent catastrophic attacks in the United States but, eventually, the constant combat footing exhausted America's will to sacrifice the lives of U.S. troops. Sensing the exhaustion, Presidents Barack Obama and Donald Trump — both skeptics of the Bush Doctrine — reduced the United States' military footprint abroad.

In Ukraine, the Reagan Doctrine is making a comeback, reminding us that we can



5. Victory in Ukraine will save the United States billions of dollars.

Russian adventurism is a drain on U.S. resources. By decimating the Russian military threat, Ukraine is reducing the amount of money the United States will have to spend defending Europe — without risking American lives to do it.

Russia might never regain the strength it has spent against Ukraine. Its military has suffered more combat deaths in Ukraine

than in all of its wars since World War II - combined. Russia has lost about 2,000 tanks — more than half its operational fleet plus thousands of other pieces of military equipment, including combat aircraft, combat vehicles, unmanned aerial vehicles, radar and antiaircraft systems, and at least 18 Navy ships. The British defense ministry estimates that 97 percent of the Russian army is now committed to Ukraine. For every Russian tank, plane and infantry division the Ukrainians eliminate, the United States will have to spend that much less to deter Russian aggression in the decades to

The impact will go beyond Europe. During the Obama administration, Russia intervened militarily in Syria on behalf of Iran and the regime of Bashar al-Assad. Today, the war in Ukraine has flipped the script: Russia has been forced to reduce its presence in Syria and redeploy critical military hardware to Ukraine. And instead of Russia helping Iran, Iran is now shoring up Russia with weapons, including military drones.

6. Support for Ukraine allows us to test new weapons and defense concepts that will increase U.S. military preparedness.

The New York Times reports: "Ukraine has become a testing ground for state-ofthe-art weapons and information systems, and new ways to use them, that Western political officials and military commanders predict could shape warfare for generations to come."

Additionally, after years of fighting nonstate actors, the war in Ukraine is reorienting the U.S. military to prepare for greatpower conflict. The axiom goes that militaries always prepare to fight the last war - which for Americans is an anti-terrorism war focused on counterinsurgency.

7. Arming Ukraine is revitalizing our

defense industrial base. Money that Congress has allocated to arm Ukraine is not being spent in Ukraine. It's going primarily to Americans — either to replace weapons sent to Ukraine from U.S. stockpiles, or to build the weapons we send to Kyiv. "When we're talking about giving assistance to Ukraine . . . these [weapons systems] are produced by American or Allied and partner countries," explains Seth Jones, the director of the international security program at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. "They are produced by General Dynamics, by Raytheon, Lockheed Martin, by Boeing in some cases. . . . And they're being built in most cases in the United States.'

> 8. The Russian invasion has strengthened U.S. alliances.

Putin intended his invasion to weaken NATO and to break U.S.-led alliances, so that his country could restore its imperial borders, and so China could have free rein in the Pacific. Instead, it has done the opposite.

Sixteen NATO allies (more than half the alliance's members) increased defense spending in 2022, while an additional seven countries have pledged to raise defense spending as a percentage of gross domestic

product in the near term. Indeed, as a percentage of GDP, the United States is tied for ninth in spending on Ukraine, behind Latvia, Estonia, Lithuania, Norway, Poland, the Netherlands, Czech Republic and Britain. Bulgaria and Finland each contribute nearly the same percentage of GDP as the United

> 9. A Russian victory could spark new wars of aggression and a global nuclear arms race.

This war is happening because Ukraine surrendered its post-Soviet nuclear arsenal at *our* insistence. After the Soviet Union collapsed, Ukraine inherited nearly 2,000 strategic nuclear weapons, along with the missiles and strategic bombers to deliver them. If Ukraine still had those weapons, Russia would never have invaded.

But in December 1994, the Clinton administration brokered an agreement called the Budapest Memorandum on Security Assurances, in which Ukraine agreed to give up those weapons. In exchange, the United States and Britain promised "to provide assistance to Ukraine . . . if Ukraine should become a victim of an act of aggression," while Russia pledged to "refrain from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of Ukraine.'

Russia's failure to live up to its pledge makes it essential that we live up to ours.

10. Victory in Ukraine is achievable. Current and former U.S. military leaders believe Ukraine can win — if given the necessary weapons to prevail. Retired Gen. Jack Keane, a former vice chief of staff of the Army, tells me that Ukraine needs tanks and armored vehicles to carry infantry; long-range precision artillery; air-defense systems; and advanced fighter iets. "Those are the ingredients to be successful," Keane says. "And if you don't have those ingredients, you cannot take the territory that you want to take in the time that you want to take it."

Of course, the most powerful argument is the one I have not made yet: Helping Ukraine is the right thing to do. It is the American thing to do. As Reagan explained 40 years ago during his "Evil Empire" speech, the United States cannot remove itself "from the struggle between right and wrong and good and evil" because "America has kept alight the torch of freedom, not just for ourselves, but for millions of others around the world." Those words ring as true today as they did in Reagan's time. The war in Ukraine is a struggle between right and wrong and good and evil, and in that struggle, America must not remain neutral.

The lesson of the 20th century is that putting "America First" requires us to project strength and deter our enemies from launching wars of aggression — so that U.S. troops to don't have to fight and die in another global conflagration. The invasion in Ukraine was a failure of deterrence. Only by helping Ukraine win can we prevent further deterrence failures.

The "America First" conclusion: Helping Ukraine is a supreme national interest.

# SEC settles on 8-game football conference schedule for 2024

DESTIN, Fla. (AP) — The Southeastern Conference will play eight league games in 2024 when it expands to 16 teams with the additions of Oklahoma and Texas, but beyond that the schedule model is still to be determined.

Commissioner Greg Sankey said Thursday, the second-to-last day of the SEC's spring meetings, that the conference's university presidents unanimously voted to implement a short-term solution to a scheduling conundrum that has been debated within the league for more than a year.

SEC leaders have been trying to decide between a nine-game conference schedule that would include three annual rivalry games and an eight-game model with one annual rivalry game.

"Our long-term options are fully open," Sankey said.

He also said, confidently, a long-term scheduling model would be hashed before the conference returns to the Florida Panhandle this time next year.

"Nobody wants to go through this every year," Sankey said.

Sankey would not commit to a renewal of the Texas-Texas A&M rivalry, which has not been played since the Aggies left the Big 12 for the SEC in 2012.

"I'm pretty confident they'll play before (2026) though," Sankey said.

Other yearly rivalries such as Alabama-Tennessee, Georgia-Auburn and Ole Miss-LSU could be worked into the 2024 schedule as well, but are not as likely as they would have been with a nine-game slate.

SEC leaders had already said they were planning to abandon the two-division structure the conference has had since 1991 when Texas and Oklahoma relocate from the Big 12. The top two teams in the standings will meet in the league championship in 2024 for the first time.

The Texas and OU move comes a year earlier than the SEC originally expected. Texas and Oklahoma were contractually bound to the Big 12 through the 2024-25 school year.

# Riley avoids big numbers for 67 on tough day at Memorial

DUBLIN, Ohio (AP) — Davis Riley opened with a 67 at the Memorial to finish atop the leaderboard after the opening round for the second straight

year. And that's where the similarities end.

Riley birdied three of his last four holes Thursday afternoon when the turf was firm and the wind was swirling and the bad breaks led to big numbers, as Rory McIlroy found

Riley was in a six-way share of the lead last year. On Thursday, he led by one over Matt Wallace. Jordan Spieth was in the group at 69, ending his hopes for a bogey-free day by hitting into two bunkers on the 18th hole

and saving bogey from the second one. It was hot. It was hard. And at times it

was tough to watch.

Chad Ramey hit four shots that went into the water on the ninth hole, which featured a front pin and a stream in front of the green. He made a 13, the highest score ever recorded on any of the holes at Muirfield Village.

He posted an 88, still shy of the record high score of 92 that Roger Maltbie shot in 1979 in a second round that featured 30 mph wind and a wind chill index of 13 degrees.

Dry and hot is the weather tournament founder Jack Nicklaus always wanted but rarely gets, and there were plenty of comparisons to a U.S. Open except for the generous fairways.

Defending champion Billy Horschel has been in a slump, and Muirfield Village was no place to try to snap out of that. Horschel had four 6s on his card of 84.

'My confidence is the lowest it's been in my entire career. I think ever in my entire golf career," Horschel said. "So it's funny, as low as it feels, it feels like I'm not that far off at the same time. Which is insane to see when you see me shoot 84 today.'

Wallace, who needs a victory this week to avoid U.S. Open qualifying, posted his 68 in the morning before the wind and the temperatures picked up. Shane Lowry had five straight birdies in the morning in relatively calm conditions, but even he wasn't immune to a fast golf course that could be punishing without notice.

McIlroy was 3 under for his round playing the 18th when his drive went right not unusual for the shape of that hole and was tumbling toward the sand until it stopped. That was very unusual. The ball was nearly belt-high and he could bare-

ly take a stance. He did his best to chop it out, and it just cleared the bunker into thick

From there, his 9-iron caught a flyer and sailed over the green to the shaggy hill.

His flop shot came out clunky and over the green and its front pin. His chip was weak. He missed the putt. And his triple bogey wiped out an otherwise good day. Spieth almost was

in that predicament. At least he was in the sand, but he hit a poor 7-iron that barely got out of the sand, just ahead of McIlroy's ball. That turned out to be a break, because when Spieth saw that happened to McIlroy's shot, he went down to a pitching wedge.

It was a flyer, but it at least took a short hop into the sand in front of the green. He came inches away from holing — as he did for birdie from the bunker on No. 10 -and got away with a bogey.

"It's nice to beat a tough golf course," Spieth said.

Mark Hubbard also was at 69 and tried to remind himself it was a very good score after his bogey-bogey finish.

"I guess on paper it wasn't what I wanted, but I had 5-iron into 16, 7-wood into 17 and 4-iron into 18. Like that's a little tough coming in there today," Hubbard said. "So I told my caddie that's the least mad I'm ever going to be bogeying the last three. Jon Rahm and Adam Scott were at 70

playing in the morning. Scottie Scheffler didn't make a putt longer than 6 feet and shot 74. That was his highest opening round since Las Vegas in October 2021. The course average was 74, the highest

for a first round at Muirfield Village since 2000. Eight players failed to break 80 that doesn't include Dylan Frittelli, who was 15 over through 14 holes when he withdrew with an illness. Riley's only bogey was nearly a superb

par, from the back bunker on the 18th to 4 feet, but then he missed the putt. A very good round turned into a great one when he made a 12-foot birdie on the sixth, hit wedge to 4 feet on the par-5 seventh and finished with a 12-foot birdie on the ninth hole.

His description of the wedge at No. 7 illustrated the difficulty.

"I got 118 yards and I'm landing it 10 yards short of the pin, 30 feet short, and it's skipping all the way there. And the wind was up," Riley said. "This is probably one of the more difficult ones all year."

Kirkwood's left rear tire bounced off the track and over the fence and the corner of the grandstand in the second turn before landing in a parking lot. It traveled about 350 yards (320 meters) before crashing into the front

of Matthews' parked Chevrolet. A red flag

halted the race after the crash. and two more red flags followed before Josef Newgarden won by beating Marcus Ericsson in a one-lap shootout.

One spectator received treatment at the infield medical center with minor injuries related to debris flying. An IMS spokesman said at the time that there were no injuries related to the tire

IndyCar owner Roger Penske says he is certain series officials will investigate what led to the tire sailing over the catch fence and grandstands. "We haven't had a wheel

come off in a long time," Penske said. "We were very fortunate we didn't have a bad accident."

# U.S. pressures air bag inflator company that refuses a recall

DETROIT (AP) - The U.S. government is turning up the pressure on ARC Automotive to recall 67 million potentially dangerous air bag inflators by ordering the company to answer questions under oath and threatening fines if it doesn't

respond. NHTSA argues that the recall is justified because two people have been killed in the United States and Canada and at least seven others injured by ARC inflators, which can explode with too much force and expel shapnel. The explosions, which first occurred in 2009, have continued as recently as this year.

The special order from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration asks multiple questions about whether ARC expects any of its inflators to blow apart in the future, and whether it has notified customers about the risk.

The agency wants ARC Automotive Inc., based in Knoxville, Tennessee, to recall the inflators, which can blow apart a metal canister. But ARC is refusing, setting up a possible court fight.

ARC maintains that no safety defect exists, that NHTSA's demand is based on a hypothesis rather than technical conclusions and that the agency has no authority to order a parts manufacturer to carry out

NHTSA has tentatively concluded that the inflators are defective. The next steps are a final conclusion, public hearing and potential lawsuit asking a judge to order a recall.

Since ARC inflators can be in both driver and passenger front air bags, people who travel in at least 33 million U.S. vehicles could be

In the order, NHTSA asks ARC to explain if it from ARC. The company

expects inflators to rupture due to something more than "random 'one-off" manufacturing problems. More than 1 million ARC inflators have been recalled already due to what the company describes as isolated trouble with manufacturing.

The order also instructs the company to estimate how many inflators will rupture while in use in the U.S. in the future, and it asks ARC why it changed its inflator manufacturing process in 2018 to install a scope that detects whether welding debris can block inflator vents.

NHTSA contends that byproducts from welding during manufacturing can clog a vent inside the inflator canister that's designed to let gas escape to fill air bags quickly in a crash. Pressure can build to the point where the canister is blown apart.

Messages were left Thursday seeking comment has to respond by June 14 or face a maximum fine of \$131.6 million and potential

criminal penalties. Michael Brooks, executive director of the Center for Auto Safety, a nonprofit advocacy group, said NHTSA is going back and connecting dots to counter what ARC asserted in its response to the recall request.

The agency, he said, seems to be trying to get ARC to say that it's possible other inflators can rupture in the future. "They are simply looking for an admission from ARC that this can happen again," Brooks said.

The company, he said, would have a hard time arguing that no more problems will occur. "I don't know that this is something that they can legitimately assert, that there's never going to be another inflator rupture," Brooks said. "There's a high likelihood of another rupture of this type. There may not be a lot of them."

NHTSA also wants to know why ARC added the scope to its manufacturing process in 2018, and it's demanding to know which ARC employee approved the decision. "I think they're trying to get at what was ARC basing that decision on and does it suggest that there's a defect in the population of inflators that were produced before that date, Brooks said.

The agency said in its recall request letter sent to ARC in April that it's not aware of any inflators rupturing that were manufactured after the scope was installed.

Owners of vehicles made by at least a dozen automakers - Chevrolet, Buick, GMC, Ford, Toyota, Stellantis, Volkswagen, Audi, BMW, Porsche, Hyundai and Kia - are left to wonder anxiously whether their vehicles contain driver or front passenger inflators made by ARC.

Because ARC supplies inflators that are included in other manufacturers' airbags, there's no easy way for vehicle owners to determine whether their inflators are made by ARC. Neither NHTSA nor ARC nor the automakers have released a full list of affected models.

One of the people who died after an inflator explosion was Marlene Beaudoin, a 40-year-old mother of 10 from Michigan's Upper Peninsula who was struck by metal fragments when her 2015 Chevrolet Traverse SUV was involved in a minor crash in 2021. She and four of her sons had been on their way to get ice cream. The sons were not hurt.

In a response letter to NHTSA earlier this month, ARC said no automaker has found a defect common to all 67 million inflators, and no root cause has been identified in the inflator rup-

# 3 people charged with aiding Chinese campaign pressuring expats

NEW YORK (AP) — An American sleuth and two Chinese men faced jurors Wednesday in the first trial to come out of U.S. claims that China's government has tried to harass, intimidate and armtwist dissidents and others abroad into returning home.

Michael McMahon, Zheng Congying and Zhu Yong are charged with being part of a conspiracy to hound a former Chinese city official, his wife and their adult daughter to get him to go back to his homeland, where the government alleges he took bribes.

"If you are willing to go back to the mainland and spend 10 years in prison, your wife and children will be all right," read a translated note that Zheng helped tape to their New Jersey door in 2018, though his lawyer said Zheng quickly had second thoughts and took the note down.

Prosecutors say it was one in a series of pressure tactics that included flying in the man's then-octogenerian father to warn him that relatives would suffer if he didn't come home.

"The victim and his family endured years of harassment," Assistant U.S. Attorney Irisa Chen said in an opening statement. "It's part of a public Chinese government initiative to force people living abroad to return to China against their will."

The defendants, charged with acting as illegal agents for China, all say they weren't aware they were doing Beijing's bidding in what's known as "Operation Fox Hunt." Their lawyers said the men believed they were helping to collect a private debt.

The trial comes as grievances mount between Beijing and Washington. This year, a Chinese spy balloon flew over the U.S., U.S. law enforcement authorities accused China of setting up a secret police station in New York, and -- just this Tuesday -- the U.S. military complained that a Chinese fighter jet made an "unnecessarily aggressive maneuver" near an American reconnaissance aircraft over the South China Sea.

China told the U.S. to stop such surveillance flights, maintains that the spy balloon was a civilian aircraft that went off-course and says the supposed secret police outposts just provide such services as driver's license renewals.

The U.S., meanwhile, has in recent years brought a number of cases like the one now on trial in a Brooklyn federal courthouse, saying they are examples "transnational repression."

China in July 2014 announced "Operation Fox Hunt," a plan to pursue and repatriate nationals it considers fugitives. Those on the wanted list include people from Muslim minority groups who simply traveled abroad for study and people whose political and cultural views clashed on some level with China's ruling Communist Party, which tolerates no dissent.

Beijing has denied all accusations of issuing threats to force repatriations and says the U.S. is discrediting legitimate Chinese crime-fighting.

The geopolitical backdrop was hardly invisible from the Brooklyn federal courtroom Wednesday.

Noting the recent rise in U.S.-China tensions, defense lawyer Paul Goldberger asked jurors "to take a long, hard look at what the (U.S.) government has done" in the case against his client, Zheng. In response, U.S. District Judge Pamela Chen warned

that "the U.S. government is

not on trial." (She isn't related to the prosecutor.) Zhu's lawyer, Kevin Tung, said he was "not here to defend the People's

Republic of China," but to defend "a person who I believe is innocent." The ex-official who was allegedly targeted, Xu Jin, came to the U.S. about a decade ago after falling out of favor with the Communist

Party, prosecutors said. They said China initially went after him by issuing an international alert that he was wanted and by publicizing the bribery allegations. His family says they are false.

China has no extradition treaty with the U.S., so Beijing can't legally compel suspects to return. Instead, according to U.S. prosecutors, the Chinese government worked through intermediaries to try to squeeze Xu into deciding to return.

While only Zhu, Zheng and McMahon are on trial at the moment, eight other people also were indicted in the case. Three have pleaded guilty; five are believed to be in China.

Zhu, a retiree, lives in New York City. In 2016, he helped hire McMahon - a retired New York Police Department sergeant turned private eye - and helped provide him personal information to track down Xu and his family, according to prosecutors. Later, Zhu picked up some Chinese people at Newark Liberty Airport and drove them to a meeting with McMahon.

His lawyer said Zhu thought he was helping a Chinese acquaintance who needed a U.S. resident's help to find a man who owed him \$400,000.

# **Average long-term U.S.** mortgage rate climbs to 6.79 percent

LOS ANGELES (AP) The average long-term U.S. mortgage rate climbed this week to its highest level since November, driving up borrowing costs for wouldbe homebuyers at a time when the housing market is being held back by a near record-low inventory of homes on the market.

Mortgage buyer Freddie Mac said Thursday that the average rate on the benchmark 30-year home loan rose to 6.79 percent from 6.57 percent last week. A year ago, the rate averaged 5.09 percent.

The latest increase marks the third in three weeks and lifts the average rate on a 30-year home loan to its highest level since it surged to 7.08 percent in early November.

The average rate on 15-year fixed-rate mortgages, popular with those refinancing their homes, rose to 6.18 percent this week from 5.97 percent last week. A year ago, it averaged 4.32 percent, Freddie Mac said.

High rates can add hundreds of dollars a month in costs for homebuyers, limiting how much they can afford in a market that remains unaffordable to many Americans after years of soaring home prices and historically low levels of housing inventory.

Mortgage rates have ticked higher along with the 10-year Treasury yield, which lenders use as a guide to pricing loans. The yield hit 3.81 percent last week, its highest point since early March, reflecting uncertainty among bond investors over whether the federal government would be able to avoid a debt default and renewed worries that the Federal Reserve may not be done hiking interest rates.

'Mortgage rates jumped this week, as a buoyant economy has prompted the market to price-in the likelihood of another Federal Reserve rate hike," said Sam Khater, Freddie Mac's chief economist. "Although there has been a steady flow of purchase demand around rates in the low- to mid-6 percent range, that demand is likely to weaken as rates approach 7 percent."

The House of Representatives approved a deal on Wednesday to prevent a possible default on the U.S. government's debt. But uncertainty over what the Fed will do at its upcoming interest rate policy meeting this month, and beyond, could keep the bond market on edge, driving more mortgage rate volatility.


Investors' expectations for future inflation, global demand for U.S. Treasurys and what the Fed does with interest rates influence rates on home loans.

The Fed has raised its benchmark interest rate 10 times in 14 months in a bid to lower stubbornly high inflation. Fed Chair Jerome Powell and other central bank officials have recently signaled that the Fed may forego another interest rate hike at this month's meeting of policymakers. Such a move would give the Fed time to evaluate the economic impact of its previous rate increases.

Still, a pause now doesn't mean the Fed couldn't resume hiking later this year. And other Fed officials continue to express support for more hikes, given inflation remains elevated. The consumer price index, which tracks inflation at the consumer level, rose 4.9 percent in April from 12 months earlier.

The U.S. housing market has been slow to regain its footing this year, with elevated mortgage rates and a thin inventory of homes on the market working to limit sales.
